

GEORGE KAISER FAMILY FOUNDATION ENDOWED CHAIR IN FAMILY AND COMMUNITY POLICY

The **Department of Human Development and Family Science (HDFS)** at **Oklahoma State University** invites applications for an **Associate Professor or Professor** in family and community policy. This position supports the HDFS department mission of conducting applied interdisciplinary scholarship focused on reducing risk and promoting resilience within individuals and families across cultures and generations. This is one of three chairs that has been endowed by the George Kaiser Family Foundation including one in Child Development and another in Child and Family Resilience.

Position Responsibilities

- Conduct research on issues to determine needs of families and communities, particularly those at risk;
- Use translational research in the development, application, and evaluation of Cooperative Extension programs that promote health, wealth, and wellbeing among Oklahoma families and communities;
- Garner external funding to support focused research program;
- Teach courses on topics related to family and community policy;
- Mentor and advise HDFS graduate students;
- Build and engage in relationships with community partners and policy makers surrounding issues relevant to the scholar's research program and other areas of science related to family and community policy; and
- Service to the department, the Cooperative Extension Service, the college, the university, and the profession is expected.

Required Qualifications

- 1. Earned doctorate in human development and family science, public policy, family economics, sociology, human geography, or related field;
- 2. A strong record of grant funding and scholarly publication, with a particular focus on the impact of public policy on family and community outcomes;
- 3. Evidence of successful collaborations with community partners, including policy makers, as shown by a record of instruction, extension/engagement, or research aligned with the needs of families and communities;
- 4. A history of outstanding teaching and student mentorship;
- 5. Strong communication and leadership skills, as evidenced by the ability to engage others in accomplishing policy objectives; and
- 6. Evidence of qualifications sufficient for associate professor or professor.

Appointment

August 2016. This position is a nine (9) month, full-time position on the OSU-Tulsa campus; the position will have a partial appointment with the Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service.

Compensation

Along with a competitive employee benefit package, the salary is commensurate with candidate qualifications and experience. Department Overview

HDFS is one of the largest departments in the university with 34 full-time faculty members, 521 undergraduate majors, and 72 graduate students across both the Tulsa and Stillwater campuses. Undergraduate specializations are offered in child and family services (CHFS), early childhood education (ECE), and family consumer sciences education (FACS). Graduate specializations are offered in child and family services (CHFS), developmental and family science (DVFS), early childhood education (ECE), gerontology (GERO), and marriage and family therapy (MFT). Recent graduates with terminal degrees (B.S. with ECE option, M.S. with MFT and CHFS options, and Ph.D.) have experienced near-100% success in finding relevant employment and in passing licensing exams. The department has formed several outstanding centers including:

- Child Development Laboratory
- Center for Family Resilience
- Center for Family Services
- Institute for Building Early Relationships

The department is home to four additional endowed faculty professorships or chairs. Consistent with the land-grant emphasis on scholarship dissemination, members of the faculty work with community partners in regional agencies and with Cooperative Extension educators in all 77 counties in Oklahoma.
